Tracey-Mae Chambers grew up as a stranger to her own story; adopted and re-named, grafted into a family tree. The discovery in adulthood of her Ojibwa-Métis heritage was a revelation that set her on a path of discovery. Her work is in the powerful tradition of the vessel as metaphor for individuals; we fill and re-fill ourselves throughout life to create our own story. #hopeandhealingcanada is Tracey-Mae Chambers' reaction to COVID-19 and her hope for healing by reconnecting with other people and our environments. The work illustrates the temporary nature of the pandemic, struggles and achievements and our very existence.

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LEADERSHIP MESSAGE

Culture and Heritage Matter

The Peel Art Gallery, Museum and Archives (PAMA) enriches the Region of Peel and supports a Community for Life by safeguarding, sharing and promoting arts and culture across Brampton, Caledon and Mississauga. PAMA exists to share the stories of Peel by providing diverse opportunities for creative exploration and discussion to help build cohesive communities. 'Nothing About Us, Without Us' – our guiding principle ensures direct participation of communities represented in our programming and exhibitions.

This Year in Review looks back at all that we achieved in 2021, in spite of the significant and continuing impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. While we remained closed to visitors, PAMA worked with community partners and stakeholders to deliver impactful programming and content through digital and virtual platforms.

PAMA secured over \$1.8 million in infrastructure funding to improve heating, ventilation and air conditioning in the Museum and Archives. Upgrades to the HVAC system will benefit our collections and provide a safe environment for our visitors.

As a place of learning, PAMA continued to foster dialogue that explored themes of belonging, home and displacement. On Canada's first National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, we mounted a live art installation on the front lawn of PAMA. Tracey-Mae Chambers' #hopeandhealingcanada depicts the artist's personal journey of reclaiming her Indigenous identity. It was an inspiring representation of many of the challenges that members of Indigenous communities face as a result of colonization and systemic displacement.

This year, PAMA established its first PAMA Youth Council, with the goal of supporting and empowering local youth. Council members will be given opportunities to share their stories and build community connections through exhibitions and programming created for youth by youth.

To support the mental health and well-being of the community during a difficult year, PAMA developed a number of key initiatives. As part of our Creative Care Packages program, we delivered 135 creative kits to isolated seniors with the help of community partners that included Brampton Meals on Wheels, Caledon Meals on Wheels, the Seva Food Bank and The Islamic Circle of North America (ICNA) Relief Canada. Looking ahead, PAMA will continue to address issues of community health and racism as it works toward attracting new audiences, seeking community input in planning, enhancing programs and strengthening its partnerships and the stewardship of Peel's cultural heritage.

For their steadfast support, we are grateful to our many donors, members, volunteers and community partners who all contributed to our accomplishments in 2021. PAMA looks forward to a full reopening in 2022. We will continue to explore, create and connect with all those in the Peel community and beyond.

Emily Warren (1869-1956)

Artist

Born in England, Emily Warren was a student of John Ruskin, an English writer, philosopher and art critic. He guided her early artistic education and purchased her work to enable her to pursue further education. Following his death, she played an instrumental part in having Ruskin's home turned into a museum and illustrated a book about him.

Warren came to Canada in 1919 when she commissioned by the Prime Minister, Sir Robert Borden, to paint several large panels. While in Canada, Warren also began a series of lecture tours across Canada, which increased the interest in her work. She used hand-painted glass slides to illustrate these lectures.

In addition to her work as an artist, she was a noted expert on architecture. Art collectors particularly valued her treatment of light in her paintings of architectural subjects. PAMA's collection includes an Untitled watercolour by Warren, showing her skill with painting architecture.



ARCHIVES PROGRAM

While PAMA was closed to the public in 2021, our Archives team focused on several critical projects aimed at preserving our collections and developing our Archival program. Despite pandemic restrictions and the need to temporarily relocate the collection for a major construction project, the team was able to maintain basic reference services.

We responded to **more than 1,100** complex inquiries over the year.

Accomplishments

- Discovered rare historical records that document the historic US Battle of the Little Bighorn. The letter and an original hand-coloured sketch, *Sundance Ceremony*, drawn by noted Lakota leader and artist Standing Bear, were transferred to the Oglala Lakota College, Woksape Tipi Archives and Tribal Repository in Kyle, South Dakota. This project was led by Archivist Samantha Thompson working with the Oglala Library and other experts to complete the complicated process of cross-border repatriation in December 2021.
- Launched a feasibility study, led by TCI Management Consultants, to identify the Archives' long-term needs and business requirements related to staffing, collections expansion and processing, storage needs and future building requirements.
- Successfully relocated several kilometres worth of archival records to temporary storage facilities. This massive project supports the construction of new environmental control systems in PAMA's collection storage vaults.

- Made considerable progress in digitizing the Russell Cooper photo-journalism negatives, capturing many of the most significant images in our collection.
- Posted more than 691 resources online via the Region of Peel Archives page on Internet Archive.
- Helped develop PAMA's virtual offerings, including an Architecture Video Series and the *Peel Time Capsule*, as well as the *Inspiring Stories of Women in the PAMA Collections* and *Stories of Service and Sacrifice*.

COLLECTIONS HIGHLIGHTS

Archives

In keeping with its role to expand and safeguard the collection while broadening the community's opportunities for research, our Archives team accepted approximately 50 acquisitions in 2021.

Acquisitions: Selected Government Records

We accepted 42 boxes of municipal government records from Peel Region and our area partners. These records illustrate how important municipal services were delivered to Peel citizens over time. They relate to plans for subdivisions and land use, heritage awareness and education, and providing clean water to homes and businesses. The records transferred include:

- Registered plans for subdivided properties in Brampton, Caledon and Mississauga (1970–2000).
- Photographs of the Peel Heritage Complex (now PAMA) exhibits and programs (1997–2000).
- Operational records shedding light on the Township of Toronto/Town of Mississauga Public Utilities Commission (PUC) and some of its waterworks/sewer projects that Peel Region took over in 1974.

Acquisitions: Selected Non-Government Records

Archival records give insights into life in our community today and in the past.

In 2021, these acquisitions included:

- Al Betts fonds: Betts family donation of thousands of photographs taken by this Streetsville photographer, dating from the 1960s to the 1980s and documenting many aspects of life in Mississauga.
- **Dianne Sutter fonds:** Records from the period when Sutter was a Regional and Brampton City Councillor, 1970s and 1980s.

- **Caledon East Railway Station fonds:** Documents illustrating the station's operations from the 1890s through the 1970s.
- Hon. Tony Clement fonds: Records documenting Clement's work as a Member of Provincial Parliament (MPP) and cabinet minister and his campaign to succeed Mike Harris as Ontario Progressive Conservative leader and Premier of Ontario.
- Living Arts Centre fonds: Records detailing the Mississauga facility's early years as a non-profit.

Art Gallery

Artist, psychiatrist and long-time Brampton resident Dr. Zdzislaw Romuald Mech graciously donated 50 of his architectural renderings of private houses and quaint images of "old" Brampton. Our Art Gallery team had a busy year expanding our permanent collection. We processed **over 100** acquisitions.

An international collector made a large-scale donation of etchings by Caroline and Franklin Armington, adding to our holdings of works by the most famous artist-couple in the collection.

We were also able to purchase photographs by Nigerian-born, Toronto-based Bidemi Oloyede, with the help of the David Somers Works on Paper Endowment Fund. This fund allows us to proactively seek out works that — through subject matter and maker — add to the diversity of our collection.

Museum

Our Museum staff were busy behind the scenes throughout 2021, taking this time to clean and assess the Museum collection and find new ways to share and connect with communities in Peel.

PAMA welcomed Collections Specialist Andrea Carswell to our Museum team. Andrea has embarked on several longterm projects to preserve and increase access to the artifacts in our care, including transitioning to a new digital The Museum collections staff completed the first phase of a major project in response to a significant upgrade to PAMA's heritage buildings. The team assessed and packed **over 13,000** artifacts to be moved off-site.

asset management system. This system will allow staff to record artifact information in one central location. In 2022, we plan to share a public-facing version that allows visitors to see more of PAMA's collections and dig deeper into artifact histories.

At the end of 2021, construction began on upgrades to the heating, cooling and ventilation system and to shelving in collections storage and workspaces. We will gradually rehouse artifacts in the improved storage areas, which will provide essential support and protection for years to come.





The ongoing pandemic restrictions compelled us to find new ways to engage with and share history. We launched several digital exhibits, including the *Peel Time Capsule*, to showcase images, video and documents crowd-sourced from the community during this unprecedented time.



Towards the end of the year, we welcomed Claire Bennett to our team as Curator, Museum. Over the next two years, Claire will be leading the redevelopment of the Museum's permanent exhibition galleries, with the support of the team.

PAMA Collections Management System

In 2021, the Archives, Art Gallery and Museum staff focused attention on improving the management of our collections with the introduction of a new collections management system (CMS). The CMS gives the collections and curatorial staff greater abilities to catalogue, research and monitor PAMA's permanent collections, whether they are working on-site or remotely. Throughout 2021, staff have been data cleaning, updating information and adding images to CMS records to aid internal research and in preparation for the launch of an online public access catalogue (OPAC). Set to launch in 2022, the online catalogue will allow members of the public to search for artworks, documents and objects in any of PAMA's collections.

Established in 1968, the <u>Art Gallery</u> permanent collection has grown to over 5700 works of historical and contemporary art, created by over 900 artists. Primarily represented by Canadian artists, with an emphasis on those associated with Peel Region, it also includes a host of international names.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Our Community Engagement team explored several unique opportunities to promote events and activities in the Peel Region over the year. Digital technology has allowed us to create new ways of interacting with the community.

Programs

PAMA continued to support local schools. While closed doors made our in-person workshops impossible, we digitized additional learning resources so that we could offer online learning.

Creative Expressions

This program offers art workshops for adults and children with developmental and physical challenges. Thanks to the Brampton and Caledon Community Foundation, we were able to distribute **224 Creative Expressions** instructional kits to five schools.

Seniors Outreach

Following safety protocols put in place during the pandemic, we withdrew PAMA's in-person outreach activities. As an alternative, we have created interactive virtual workshops so that we can safely share our programs for seniors and provide social engagement.

Public Programs

While closed to visitors, PAMA offered several online firsts, including a virtual international artist talk for the exhibition *when night stirred at sea: Contemporary Caribbean Art* and an art themed 'Do It Yourself' (DIY) Escape Room. We received great feedback from participants after both offerings.



PAMA hosted a live outdoor art installation, with Tracey-Mae Chambers sharing work from her *#hopeandhealingcanada* project. During the seven-hour installation, the artist engaged with visitors on-site and answered questions about her art.




Screen capture from the June 2021 closing event of *Photovoice: A Newcomer's Journey*

Creative Care Packages

In June 2021, PAMA and the Friends of PAMA Advisory Board joined the Great Canadian Giving Challenge organized through CanadaHelps. CanadaHelps challenged Canadians to donate to an organization of their choice and for every dollar raised, that organization would receive a ballot to win \$20,000.

The Friends of PAMA campaigned for funding to provide Creative Care Packages to isolated seniors in the Peel Region. These packages included activities and supplies and were delivered to seniors in the community through a partnership with Brampton Meals on Wheels, Caledon Meals on Wheels, Seva Food Bank and Islamic Circle of North America (ICNA) Relief Canada.

We thank all those who supported this campaign.

The Friends soon surpassed their initial goal of \$3,000 needed to provide 100 kits: through the generosity of donors, they raised **\$4,104**, which allowed us to distribute **135 kits**.

New Beginnings

PAMA wished Karla Hale, Director, Community Connections a fond farewell and happy retirement in 2021. Joining the Region in 1987 as a Social Service Worker, Karla experienced a vibrant and storied career across the organization leading many departments and divisions, including PAMA.



PAMA Remembers

Professor Thomas H.B. Symons, May 30, 1929 – January 1, 2021

Tom Symons was the founding president of Trent University and an advocate and supporter of many other institutions and causes. At Trent, he created one of the first Canadian studies programs. Now common across universities, the field was largely unheard of before his tenure. He also instigated Canada's first Indigenous studies program.

The grandson of William Perkins Bull, whose contributions are central to many PAMA collections, played a key role in making Perkins Bull historical materials available to a range of public institutions in the 1960s. These resources were eventually transferred to PAMA. He remained a passionate supporter of PAMA for over 60 years, and he helped to establish the Bull Family Endowment Fund before his passing.

William Grenville Davis, July 30, 1929 - August 8, 2021

William Davis had a long history in Peel and Brampton, from his days watching his father try cases in the Peel County Courthouse, to his term as a law clerk visiting the Registry Building (both buildings are now part of the PAMA campus). He is more widely known for his role as the 18th Premier of Ontario (1971 to 1985).

He continued to support PAMA throughout his life. It was a great honour for us to host an evening with William Davis and his biographer Steve Paikin to promote his 2016 book *Bill Davis: Nation Builder, and Not So Bland After All.*
